## WAYNE COUNTY COMMUNITY PROFILE

Wayne County in Michigan covers 672 square miles, of which 614 square miles are land and 58 square miles are water (including parts of the Detroit River and Lake St. Clair). Wayne County, excluding Detroit, occupies 478.5 square miles. Wayne County is bordered by Oakland County and Macomb County to the north, Washtenaw County to the west, and Monroe County to the south.

Land use in 2000 for Wayne County, excluding Detroit, was: 37% residential; 21.6% commercial and industrial; 25.1% woods, wetland and grasslands; 8.5% active agriculture; and the remaining 7.8% classified as cultural, recreational, barren, water and under development.

The County is Michigan's only "charter county," with a home rule charter setting up its structures within limits established by state law and the state constitution. All other Michigan county governments are structured according to state law, without a locally-adopted charter.

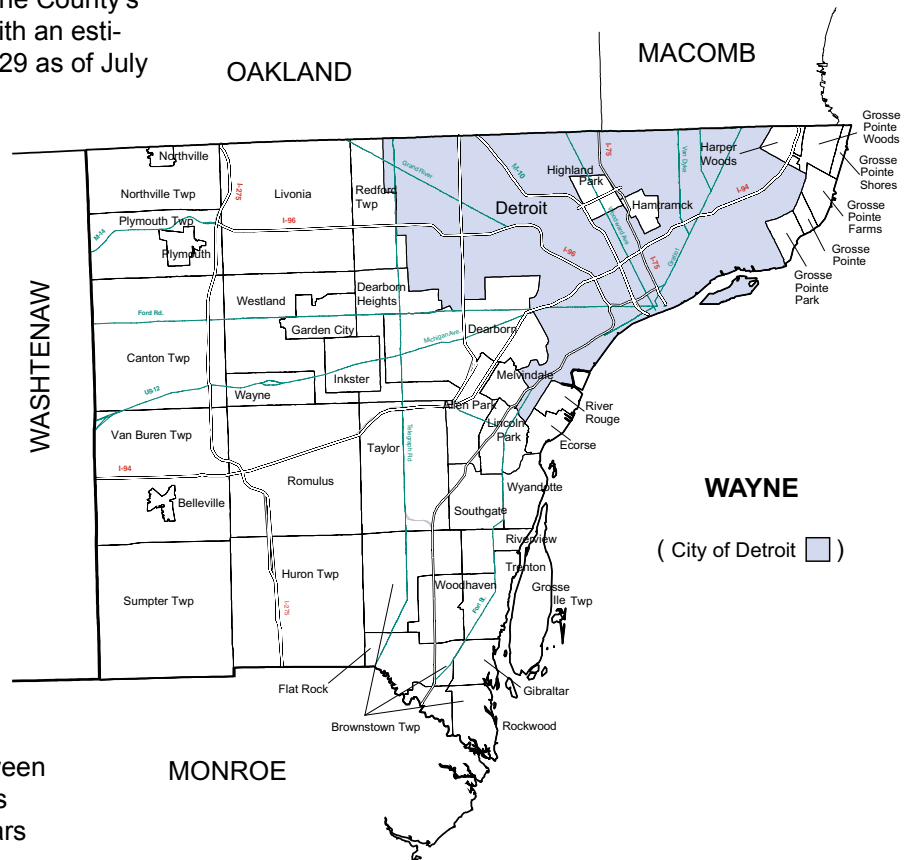
As of the 2000 census, Wayne County's population was 2,061,162 with an estimated population of 1,949,929 as of July 1, 2008. The county seat is Detroit, the largest city in Michigan. The Wayne County Department of Public Health serves an estimated 1,037,867 persons residing in the County, excluding the City of Detroit (served by the Detroit Department of Health and Wellness Promotion).

Recently released 2008 U.S. Census estimates indicate that Wayne County, excluding Detroit, has 24.9% of its population under age 18, 50.3% of its population between 18-54 years, 12.0% of its population between 55-64 years and 12.7% of its population older than 65 years of age.

Wayne County, excluding Detroit, is becoming more racially diversified. The number of non-white residents increased from 14.5% in 2000 to an estimated 19.4% in 2008.

There are 424,663 households, excluding Detroit, with an average income of \$69,798. Within these households, 2008 income estimates range from: 20.8% for less than \$25,000; 25.0% between \$25,000 and \$49,999; 32.7% between \$50,000 and \$99,999; 18.4% between \$100,000 and \$199,999; and 3.1% with \$200,000 or more.

Between 2000 and 2008, the poverty rate increased from 8.2% to 13.1%.



## START LIVING HEALTHY INITIATIVE: WAYNE COUNTY ENCOURAGES PEOPLE TO START LIVING HEALTHY!

Overeating the wrong foods... sitting still most of the day... and smoking.

These unhealthy habits are creating a deadly epidemic of obesity, diabetes, cancer and heart disease for millions of Americans.

That's why the Wayne County Department of Public Health is leading an innovative campaign for residents and employees to "Start Living Healthy."



The "Start Living Healthy" program encourages people to improve their lifestyles – and live longer – by eating healthy foods, exercising, and quitting harmful habits like smoking. It does this by providing people with the tools they need to successfully make these changes, including a smoking cessation program, yoga classes and events that demonstrate delicious ways to prepare nutritious foods.

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," Benjamin Franklin once said. Today, his famous quote summarizes the philosophy of the Start Living Healthy campaign. Research proves that simple, daily changes – such as taking a walk, avoiding tobacco and eating more fruits and vegetables – can significantly lower a person's risk for the chronic diseases that affect 90 million Americans.

"Our Start Living Healthy program can add years to a person's life," says Loretta V. Davis, Director/Health Officer of Wayne County's Department of Public Health. "We're excited to create an awareness of how people can make healthier decisions throughout the day, such as choosing a low-fat stir-fry with chicken and vegetables instead of a burger and fries, or taking a walk after dinner instead of sitting on the couch to watch television."

Environmentalist Goutama Pinnamaneni received an award for walking the most individual steps – 264,000 and counting – or 120 plus miles.*

Here are some of the programs sponsored by the Start Living Healthy initiative:

**The Walking and Nutrition Education Project** offers seminars that show people how to incorporate walking and good nutrition into their busy, daily routines. The program encourages men and women to walk outdoors, in shopping malls and on treadmills. Held in Wayne County offices for both employees and the public, these free seminars explain the wonderful benefits of healthy eating and exercise, such as boosting energy, preventing disease and losing weight.

**The Smoking Cessation Program** offers a variety of methods that help people quit smoking. These free seminars throughout the community also educate men and women about the health hazards of tobacco, as well as the dangers of second hand smoke. The presentation emphasizes the fact that smoking causes deadly lung cancer, and that risk can immediately be reduced when smokers become non-smokers.

**The Cancer Awareness Information Campaign** encourages women in Wayne County to protect themselves from breast cancer by performing monthly self-exams and getting annual mammograms starting at age 40. This campaign sends reminder postcards to female residents on their 40th birthdays. Since it started in January 2007, about 1,300 cards are sent to women monthly, encouraging more than 15,000 women to get mammograms every year. This campaign can save lives because early detection of breast cancer results in a five-year survival rate of 98%, according to the American Cancer Society.

**The Building Healthy Communities Project** targets specific health problems in high-risk zones throughout Wayne County. One such zone is Ecorse, where cardiovascular disease contributed to a significant number of deaths in 2006. Starting in April 2008, this three-year strategic plan is succeeding, thanks to a grant and civic, corporate and community support. The program teaches men, women and children how to eat heart-healthy foods, avoid tobacco and get more exercise.

Another initiative associated with this program involves Wayne County Start Living Healthy consultant Angela Stevenson working with community stakeholders to create a smoke-free fitness trail in Ecorse's Eli Ciungan Park.

Deputy Health Officer Barbara Harris-Ellis, who is the chairperson of the Start Living Healthy Committee, encourages Wayne County residents and employees to participate in other events and programs that promote good health.

**A mammogram could be the gift of life.**  
A mammogram is an X-ray of the breast. If you are 40 years or older, be sure to see a doctor to schedule a mammogram screening every one or two years. Mammograms are the best way to find a change in your breast before it is big enough for you to feel or cause symptoms. Getting regular mammograms is an important part of protecting your health. Having it around your birthday is one way to remember.

**Breast self-exam.**  
A breast self-exam is when you check your own breasts for lumps, changes in size or shape of the breast, or any other changes in the breasts or underarm (armpit). Do this at home at least once a month.

**Clinical breast exam.**  
A clinical breast exam is an examination by a doctor or nurse who uses his or her hands to check the breasts for lumps or other changes.

## PROGRAM SERVICES AT A GLANCE

### Environmental Health

This program strives to prevent illness and disease in the places where people live, eat, work, play and attend school in Wayne County. The Environmental Health Program does this by inspecting restaurants, certifying foodservice managers, protecting drinking water, overseeing public swimming pools and beaches, preventing lead poisoning in children, tracking West Nile Virus activity, regulating private wells and septic systems, and scrutinizing body art facilities.

Radon gas poses a significant environmental health threat at elevated levels, and is the second leading cause of lung cancer, surpassed only by smoking. The Wayne County Department of Public Health encourages all residents to test their homes for radon during the heating season.*

*During August 2008, the Wayne County Department of Public Health closed the Belleville Lake public beach in Van Buren Township. The beach was closed for more than a week, after water samples were found to exceed the Michigan Public Health Code bathing beach water quality standard for E. coli bacteria.*



## PROGRAM SERVICES AT A GLANCE

### Nutrition Program

Good nutrition is vital, especially for pregnant women, babies and children. That's why our nutrition services include the Women, Infants and Children's program. WIC helps low-income mothers who have children up to age five, by providing Bridge Cards to purchase healthy groceries. WIC also offers free health screenings, social service referrals and breast-feeding support services. In addition, our Summer Food Program serves free, nutritious lunches to children through age 18, and to adults who are mentally and physically handicapped.

## PROGRAM SERVICES AT A GLANCE

### Communicable Disease Program

HIV, STD, influenza and salmonella – each poses a significant public health risk. The Communicable Disease Program works diligently to protect residents and businesses in Wayne County from these threats, and many more, through prevention, surveillance and control measures. The HIV/AIDS prevention program provides free, confidential testing and counseling. It also educates the community about how to prevent the spread of HIV and AIDS. The STD clinic offers testing for sexually transmitted diseases such as chlamydia and gonorrhea. At the same time, Communicable Disease Control monitors infectious diseases, including those that are vaccine-preventable or which are spread through contaminated food. The School Immunization Program monitors school records to make sure that children are vaccinated against illness and disease.

### Women and Child Health Services

This program helps women and children in Wayne County stay healthy through a variety of services that prevent, treat and respond to illnesses. A major component of Women and Child Health Services includes education, counseling and referrals that lay a solid, healthy foundation for mothers, babies and children. These programs include family planning, educational evaluations and screenings for hearing and vision.

## PROGRAM SERVICES AT A GLANCE

### Wayne County Babies/Operation Safe Sleep

The Wayne County Babies outreach program, which began in fall 2005, focuses on reducing infant mortality in Wayne County by supporting mothers and their families during their pregnancies and throughout the babies' first year of life. Through classes and counseling, the program educates mothers and their families about the safest way for a baby to sleep to prevent Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). The program also distributes Pack 'n Play cribs to many families.

## PROGRAM SERVICES AT A GLANCE

### Community Health Services

This program provides access to health services, education, disease prevention and referrals to Wayne County residents so they can stay healthy and live longer. These services include reviewing cases of infant mortality and educating people about how to keep babies safe and healthy. The Dental Care/Oral Health Services program provides exams, x-rays, preventive and restorative care for uninsured children and people under age 21. Through outreach, Wayne County staff assists parents in completing applications for Medicaid programs. For adults, Community Health Services provides immunizations as well as programs that help people stop smoking.

### Health Emergency Preparedness and Response

If an infectious disease or bioterrorism attack or natural disaster were to occur, this program implements emergency action plans to protect people and save lives. By strategizing how to deal with public health threats before they strike, the Health Emergency Preparedness and Response program can instruct the community on how to respond when necessary. The program has procedures in place for quarantines, mass vaccinations, and educational campaigns to disseminate life-saving information to the public. It also provides a plethora of resources that teach individuals and families how to prepare for emergencies.

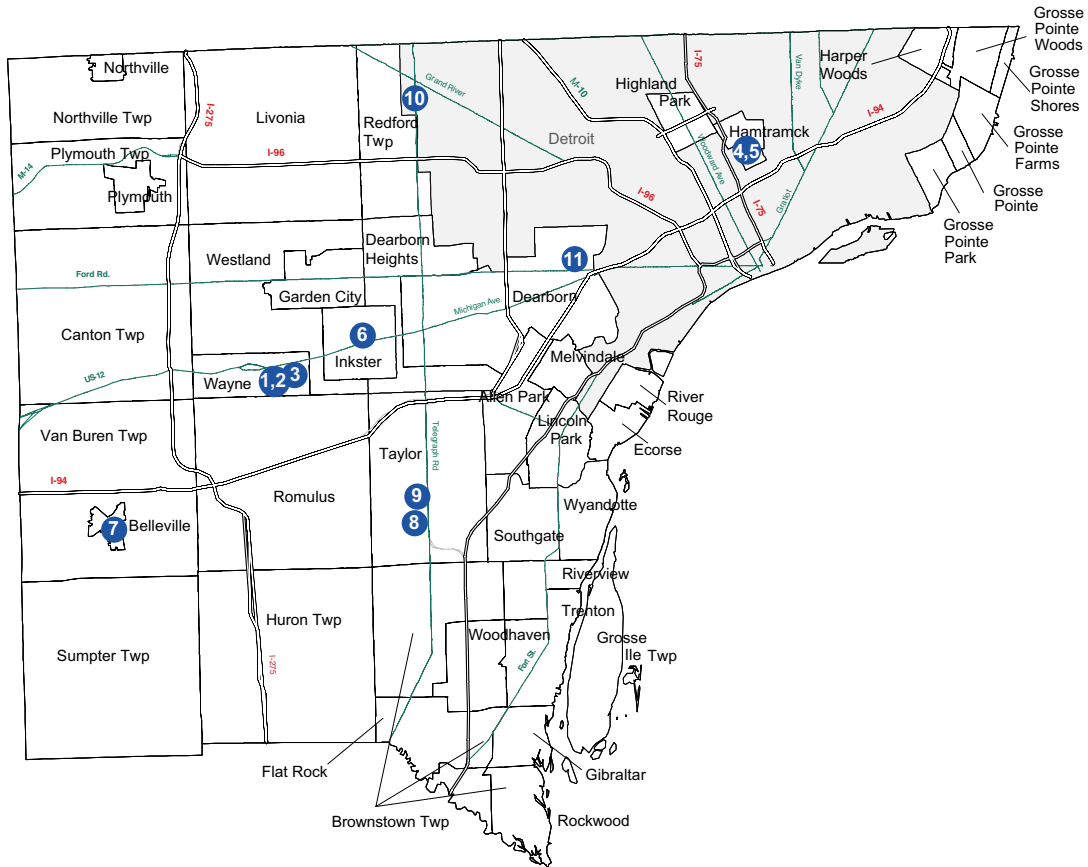

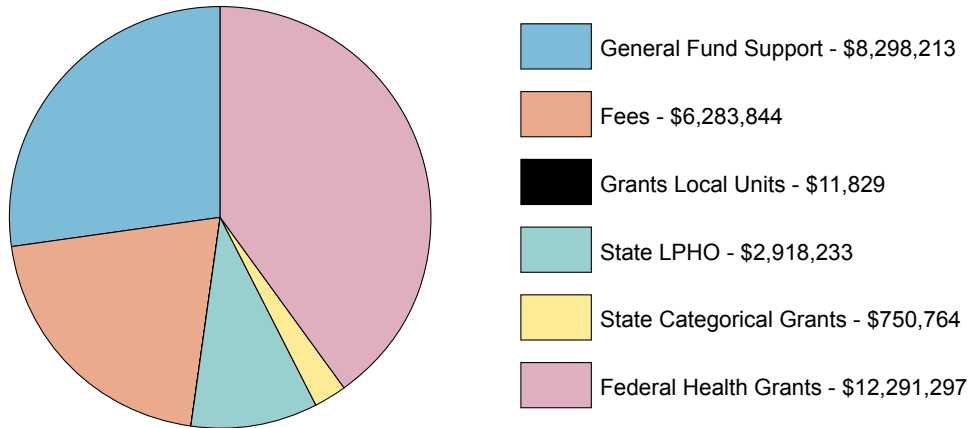

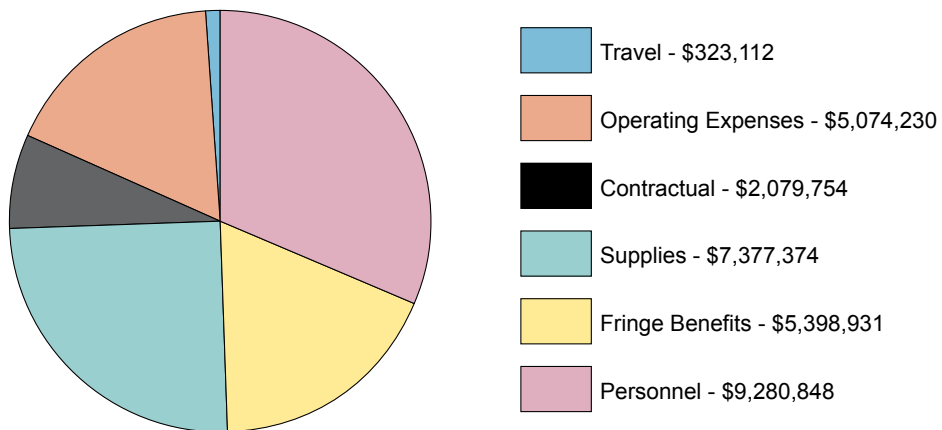

### FISCAL YEAR 2007 REVENUES: \$30,554,180

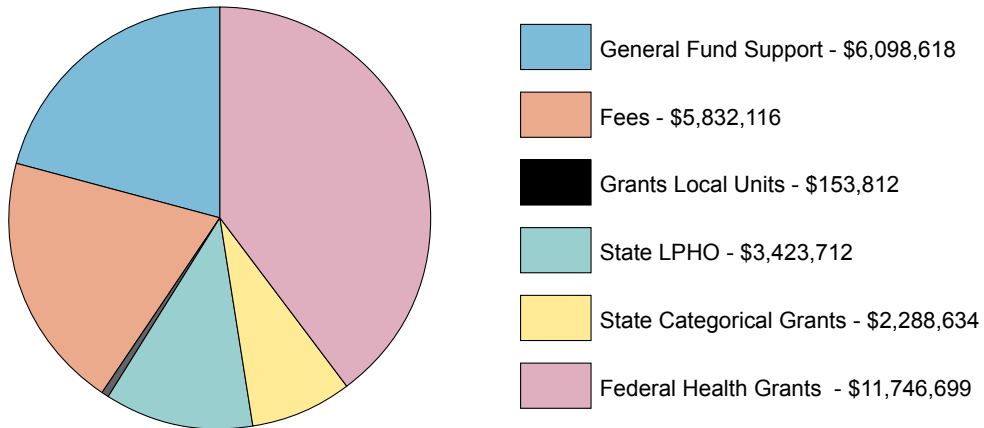


### FISCAL YEAR 2007 EXPENDITURES: \$29,534,249

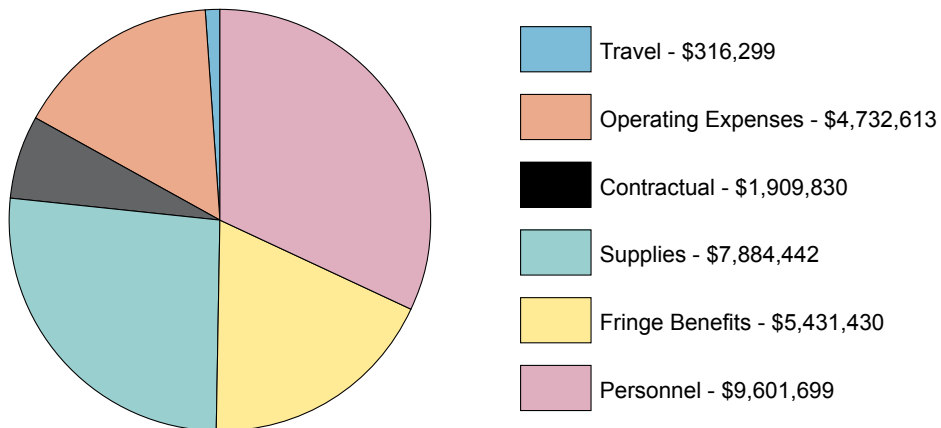


## 2008 FINANCIAL REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES
